RON & SHARY ASHER FAMILY SCHOLARSHIP

Selection Criteria: A North Platte High School senior in the upper 50% of their class who has taken educational risks with their course choices, taking harder classes for the mental challenge rather than worrying about maintaining a perfect grade point average. The student must be a good citizen, having demonstrated caring for others. In addition, the recipient should be worthy of the scholarship, yet may not fit exactly into a niche elsewhere. Members of the TeamMates Mentoring Program or other mentoring program are to be given preference for selection. This scholarship is available to all students meeting the criteria, regardless of financial need.

Limitations: One student per year beginning in spring 2002. This scholarship is limited to students attending higher education institutions located in Nebraska. It is non-renewable.

Amount: 4% of the principal on the fund or \$500 (whichever is greater).

Selection: The North Platte High School Scholarship Selection Committee will choose the scholarship recipient. Class transcripts should be submitted.

The North Platte Public Schools Foundation, Inc. (NPPSF) will manage and administer the Ron and Shary Asher Family Scholarship and income may be added to the fund's principal at any time. The donor understands that one percent (1%) of the income earned on an annual basis of the Ron and Shary Asher Family Scholarship shall be retained annually by the North Platte Public Schools Foundation, Inc. to offset administrative expenses. If a time occurs when there is less than \$500 of principal remaining in Ron and Shary Asher Family Scholarship Fund, prohibiting the distribution of the scholarship as described, the remaining balance will be transferred into North Platte Public Schools Foundation's general fund.
